# A memorable work experience...

Overall, the whole experience was truly great - better that we could've imagined! It's honestly hard to believe it was first time the team put together something like this structure. From start to finish, it ran smoothly and felt incredibly well thought out, and it showed in every parts of the day. It's rarely to find a first-time set up elsewhere that runs that well.

What made the whole experience even more enjoyable was getting the behind the sense look at how different departments within the museums operate. I was lucky enough to explore the departments of Curating and Marketing. It opens out eyes to just how much works and cooperations goes into running a museum. It was fascinating to see different roles in each departments play together.

# DAY 1

Day 1 was all about introductions - getting to know the team, the space, and what we'll be doing over the next few days here.

We began with a warm welcome from the staff, who introduced us to the museum. One of the highlights of the day was meeting the marketing team. They gave us our first task: helping with social media content! It was exciting to be trusted with something so public-facing and creative right from the start.

Later on, we moved to a workshop room where we made our own name badges. It might seem like a small activity, but it was actually one of the most fun and personal parts of the day. We got to decorate our badges however we liked, making each one unique. It felt like a creative way to express ourselves - and these badges are something we can be able to look back on in the future as a reminder of this experience.

# DAY 2

Day 2 of my work experience was mainly about exploring! We went on a one day tour across three different Derby Museums sites: Pickford's House, Derby Museum and Art Gallery, and the Museum of Making.

Although the weather wasn't on our side, it was still a really enjoyable and eye-opening day. Each site has its own unique focus and environment, which made the tour more interesting.

Pickford's House is beautifully preserved, each one telling its own story of how people lived during that time. One

unexpected part of the day was having a cameraman with us, filming parts of our experience. It definitely made me feel a bit nervous at first, knowing the camera was there.

The Art Gallery featured some amazing pieces, and it was inspiring to see local creativity in display.

Finally, at the Museum of Making, we also took part in a creative activity: making our own handmade Japanese style booklets. It was a relaxing, hands on experience. It was something new and I will definitely remember it!

# DAY 3

Day 3 of my work experience was all about going behind the scenes - We were split into different groups, and I was placed with the CURATOR TEAM.

Working with the curators gave me a whole new perspective on how museums operate. We got hands on with 3D scanning, learning how to digitally capture real life objects. We also used software to edit and explore the scanned objects. It was fascinating to see how technology is being used.

What stood out most was getting to see the work that behind the scenes, so much going on to prepare exhibitions, protect collections. It made me realise how much teamwork and creativity is involved in curating.

Overall, today was a fun and eye-opening experience that showed me a completely different side of museum life - one I hadn't thought much about before.

# DAY 4

Day 4 is DEFINITELY MY FAVOURITE DAY OF THE WEEK! Once again, we were split into different groups - and this time, I joined the Marketing Team at Derby Museum.

It was a brilliant experience seeing how marketing plays such an important role in how the museum operates. From planning content to engage with the public.

My Week at Derby Museums – A Journey of Learning, Creativity, and Teamwork

With just seven days to go, excitement and curiosity filled the air. I was about to begin a unique one-week work experience at three of Derby's most iconic cultural sites: the Museum of Making, the Museum and Art Gallery, and Pickford's House. Looking back now, the week was more than just an insight into museum life - it was a journey that sharpened my professional skills and helped me grow personally.

We began each day at 9:30 a.m., meeting our coordinator, Kathryn Levy, who would guide us through the experience. On Monday, Thursday, and Friday, we were based at the Museum of Making. On Tuesday and Wednesday, we explored the Museum and Art Gallery, with the chance to visit Pickford's House at certain points. At both locations, we were welcomed into a private space where we received thorough briefings about health and safety, fire procedures, and the expected code of conduct - important reminders of how vital responsibility and awareness are in a professional environment.

Our first day set the tone for the week. We were introduced to the marketing team, who gave us an exciting task: to capture engaging content throughout our time at the museums. This content would help promote the museums 'work and be used as an ongoing project. This activity developed my communication and creative thinking skills, as I had to consider how to present information visually and verbally in a way that would appeal to the public. In the afternoon, we joined a workshop that introduced us to handson museum work, where we began a creative making activity. This practical session encouraged problem-solving and attention to detail, key skills that I know are useful in any future role.

Tuesday was a day of exploration. We toured all three sites, learning about the interactive features designed for families and how the museums engage different audiences. This helped us start brainstorming ideas for our own content and showed us how important audience awareness and adaptability are in the cultural and educational sector. It also gave me a fresh perspective on teamwork and how different

departments must collaborate for events and exhibitions to run smoothly.

On Wednesday and Thursday, we were placed into teams of our choice, based on interests ranging from Curators, Fundraising, Venue Hire and Retail, to Learning and Volunteering. Working with different teams gave us an amazing opportunity to dive deeper into the roles behind the scenes. My time with the Learning and Volunteering team was especially eye-opening. I helped plan learning activities and saw firsthand how these events are tailored to different groups, which strengthened my organisational and planning skills.



Finally, Friday was all about bringing everything together. We collated the marketing content and written materials we had created during the week. It was exciting to know that our work could potentially feature on the museums 'website. We also worked on producing learning resources, applying everything we'd picked up across the week. To finish off, we

had the privilege of hearing from the director, Tony Butler. His inspiring talk reminded me of the value of passion, persistence, and vision in building a meaningful career.

Throughout the week, I developed so many transferable skills - from teamwork, time management, and communication, to creativity, professionalism, and initiative. More than that, I gained a deep appreciation for how museums operate and how much dedication goes into creating engaging and educational experiences for the public.

This placement didn't just help me understand the museum world - it gave me skills and confidence that I'll carry into any future role. Whether I pursue a career in the arts, marketing, education, or beyond, I now know the power of collaboration and the importance of being curious and open to learning.

# My Week at Derby Museums:

Spending a week at derby museums was a unique and inspiring experience that gave me a taste of working in the museum sector while learning practical skills that I can take with me into the world of work. This gave me insight into the professional presentation side of working in a creative industry. Later, I had a talk about starting a new business , which was incredibly helpful. It gave me a clearer idea of what it takes to become an entrepreneur, from branding to planning to understanding your audience. This 10-15min conversation gave me a big insight into how I could one day turn a passion into a career.

### **Thursday:**

On Thursday, we focused on marketing how to promote events, exhibitions, and experiences to different audiences. I learned how important communication and creativity

are in getting the word out and encouraging community involvement. As well as this we also made posts that are going to be posted on the derby museums instagram account

Most of the day consisted in familiarising ourselves with the three different sites of each museum, starting off at the Museum and Art Gallery, then moving onto Pickford's House, and finally ending up at the Museum of Making (lots of walking, I know), where we had spent our first day in. During these tours, we were set the task to create a trail for families and visitors to partake in when exploring the Museums - which would be covered throughout the whole of the week. My group's target audience was given the age range of five-to-eight year olds, but also include their parents as the aim was to encourage family discussions, and so me and my partner set off to find whatever we could include into our little project within the Museum and Art Gallery + Pickford's House.

It was quite the long day filled with lots of talking and explaining, but it was interesting to get to know the Museums better.

# Wednesday 16th - Venue Hire.

Our main task for the day was to help set up a fake wedding photoshoot to advertise the availability of the venue to be hired for such a purpose.

Before anything else, we were sat down and given a brief introduction into the venue hire team - into advertising and promoting - basically how the team would set up events and what they had to keep in mind whilst doing so as to ensure efficiency and profit from each.

After that, we went on a short trip to the wedding dress shop, where we collected what the model would be wearing for the shoot and returned to the venue shortly after, where we began to set up and decorate tables and the setting overall whilst other members began getting ready for the photographing. It was really satisfying to see everything come together eventually, as it ended up looking beautiful.

After the main photographs were taken, they actually gave us the opportunity to pick out our own locations that we believed would look good for the advertising, which was quite fun to do. Once the models left, we had to take everything down - which was quite shocking to see everything be emptied after looking so pretty!

Despite all the walking and constant wander up and down the many flights of stairs, it was actually quite a fun day, and I loved working with the staff as they were all really welcoming and helpful.

# Thursday 17th - Learning.

I actually arrived at the wrong location on this day... (It's okay, I made it back on time, but it served as a reminder that timetables are there for a reason!!!)

The day started off at the Museum of Making, where we were given some context as to what we'd be doing for the day before walking over to the Museum and Art Gallery in order to help out setting up a couple of rooms for upcoming events and meetings. It mostly consisted of moving some chairs and tables and getting certain artefacts into place for a showcase, which was interesting to see how events for different audiences were set up differently.

We returned to the Museum of Making once again after lunch, where we began to set up an activity in the Gallery, meant to allow visitors to interact with pulleys and sand bags to experiment how arranging them differently may make the sandbag easier or harder to lift with a rope. Once everything was well prepared, we allowed people to begin joining into the activity, chipping in every now and then if they needed any help or explanation as to how it worked. The activity was ongoing for up to 45 minutes, until we had to take it all apart and set up the previous station yet again.

We finished off the day with a small session/activity in which we learnt how to consider risks in the workplace and fill out a Risk Assessment Sheet, where you keep track of anything that may suppose a danger during a certain activity within the Museums. This really allowed us to find out just how much members like Former Learning Programmers and Program Coordinators have to keep in mind in terms of possible dangers throughout an event.

# Friday 18th - Admin.

The day began with a direct talk from Tony Butler, the CEO of Derby Museums, who explained part of his role and the experiences that led him into working with the Museums, as well as answered questions on the topic of business and hiring. It was a good opportunity to learn more about how the business works and the tasks someone in his place has to do.

# Day 1

On day 1, I spent the day doing a marketing activity that entailed me taking pictures of different pieces at the Museum of Making and writing up about them. This made me understand the importance of marketing for a company as it will help the company grow

and attract more people to them.



In addition to day 1, I was in the workshop where I made some name badges, did some wood carving and forgery.

To make my name badges, I used Jesmonite. This was very fun experience because it allowed me to showcase creative side and allowed me to go out of my comfort zone. I was able to gain some skills such as attention to detail because when the Jesmonite reacts together, it quickly hardens and it needed to be poured into the mould as quickly as possible.

During forgery, I used a harmer to flatten the end of a metal rod. I learnt about safety and different techniques used to check whether or not a metal is hot by hovering over the metal and touching it lightly to know if the metal is hot or not.

This was a very important session for me because it helped me understand the importance of safety in



In addition, I improved my research skills as I was a told to research some facts about the beehive quern. This led me to finding out a quern was used to grind down grains into flour during the Roman era.

I was also able to improve my computer skills as I inputed different data into an excel spreadsheet to make it easier for records of certain artefacts to be found easily when they need to be accessed.

# Day 5

On day 5, we all got a talk from the executive Tony Butler and he told us what it is like working in a museum as he started working in a museum by volunteering there first, then working in different museums helped him gain experience. He also explained that it is good to show your inner creative side and just because someone does STEM subjects it doesn't make them smarter than people who are good at humanities subjects, English or very creative people.

Overall, I have learned some good transferable skills such as time management because we were told to get back to the site at certain times and I was able to accomplish them. I was able to improve my communication skills because I worked with different departments in the museum like the learning department, the curator department, the marketing department and the volunteering department. I was also able to improve my team working skills as I was working in teams in every session.




At the end of the day I bought some postcard from Pickford House, I think they are pretty and the price is very lovely . We also made a Japanese booklet. The

experience that I never tired before, I truly enjoy this day and it really extend my understanding about the job in the museum.




# Day-4
